




In order to promote high quality books, we are going to share the monthly recommended reads from 'The Reader Teacher' website.

All the children in year 3 and 4 took part in a project about Saint Etheldreda by Ely Cathedral. We learnt how she was a Saxon Princess, she wanted to be a nun but was not allowed to. Eventually she wanted to build her own monastery. But, hers would be for men and women, a place where they could spend their lives devoted to God. So, she set about building the very first religious community on the Isle of Ely.

Unfortunately, she died from a tumour. When her body was dug up to be moved to the new tomb everyone was amazed! Her body was perfect, the tumour was gone, and she smelled of roses. This is a sign that someone is a saint and from that day on Etheldreda has been known as St Etheldreda.

The culmination of the project was for the children to create a piece of artwork. The children all worked together to design and create the final collage inspired by Henri Matisse. These have been entered into a competition to be displayed in the cathedral. We think the children did a fabulous job.
